"I Belong Here"

D ill knew his son was smart but that he was also restless. When Michael ultimately decided to become a doctor like his brothers, he chose a medical school overseas. It was there that he got hooked on cocaine and began a steady, downward spiral into the world of chemical dependence. "It was a disaster," his father explains. "He became a full-blown addict so we turned to Talbot House."

The Catholic Charities 24-hour crisis center offers medically-monitored withdrawal services to those who

admitted, Michael met Sr. Jane, a counselor who have nowhere else to turn. Once challenged him with the brutal honesty needed to recover. Michael wanted to give up, but Jane wouldn't let him. After several grueling weeks, he successfully graduated from Talbot and moved on to other recovery programs. With his life back on track, he finished medical school and had just decided on a residency program when disaster struck. The parents of a childhood friend battling alcoholism called, pleading desperately for his help. Michael responded, setting off on a drive that ultimately ended his life in an accident caused by an

"It wasn't enough for Michael that he beat it. He was going to help others beat it too. I grieve for my son, but he inspires me impaired driver. every day." In fact, Bill recently graduated with a master's degree in Pastoral Studies from the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception. A chaplain at St. Joseph Hospital he also volunteers as a spiritual counselor at Talbot House. "Michael said he owed his life to Talbot House. I know I belong here carrying on his work."

It's Never Too Late

My Dear Friend,

November marks the end of the Jubilee Year of Mercy. Since last December, Pope Francis has asked us to bring God's healing mercy to our world, and in doing so to move closer to Jesus. If you somehow missed this wonderful opportunity, I offer this Gospel passage:

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." He then said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was distressed that he had said to him a third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep." (John 21:15-17)

Just weeks before, Peter had denied Jesus three times. Now he was being given three new opportunities to wipe the slate clean and prove his love! But our Lord met each of Peter's fervent responses with a demand that he serve His people. Our Lord was making it abundantly clear that lip service wouldn't cut it! If we really love God then we must care for his people. He gave us the most straightforward, uncomplicated recipe for love that He could muster – and He gave it to us three times!

At Catholic Charities love is alive and well. It cooks meals at our Senior Centers and pulls the heroin addict through withdrawal. It builds the cribs, delivers food and it's what fuels all of our 14 ministries that serve 59,000 people a year.
