

WORKING WELL WITH OTHERS

Catholic Charities of Long Island successfully works with many partners within the Church and community. One of our most important relationships is with the parishes of the Diocese of Rockville Centre. Our staff provides support and training to more than 100 parishes with vital Parish Social Ministry outreach offerings and a Central Information and Referral line directing callers to valuable resources. We hold mutually beneficial relationships with other diocesan entities including Catholic Health, The Catholic Faith Network. Catholic Schools and Catholic Youth personnel also Organization. Our administer government-supported programs such as Meals-On-Wheels for homebound seniors, the Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) and our Nutrition Outreach Education Program (NOEP) that assists low-income Long Islanders applying for benefits.

TAKING STEPS FORWARD

Chief Executive Officer Michael E. Smith came on board at Catholic Charities of Long Island in February 2023 with more than a quarter-century of experience in the nonprofit sector. "He displays a Gospel-driven compassion for people that's really at the heart of the Catholic Charities mission," stated Tom Alexanderson, Chair of CCLI's Board of Trustees. Two of Smith's first hires were Director of Human Resources, Karina Contti, and Director of Communications and Development Danielle Campbell. The newcomers joined a talented team of executives: Paul Engelhart, COO, Rich Balcom, CFO, and Jay Korth, Director of Housing and Legal Affairs. He also brought on three new board members for 2024. They along with program directors, staff and volunteers determined to build on our 67-year history of "Care with Dignity...Life with Hope." In 2023, we increased services to clients by more than 17,000 to 1.217 million and the ranks of served clients swelled by more than 4,000 to 37,437. Smith plans to explore targeted growth, especially opportunities to address Long Island's housing affordability crisis. Weekly segments highlighting our services and events on the Catholic Faith Network and presentations to Catholic school students about the mission of Catholic Charities are among his recent initiatives.

During this year's Catholic Schools Week, Danielle Campbell, director of communications and development at Catholic Charities, and President and CEO Michael Smith visited with 3,000 students at six Catholic elementary schools in Nassau and Suffolk counties.

Students learned about the wide range of spiritual and corporal works of mercy grounded in living Jesus and the Gospel that Catholic Charities delivers each day at its Long Island ministries.

The students paid close attention to a video presentation about CCLI programs and services and one first-grader shared that after watching it, she felt a light go on inside her. May that Divine spark illuminate the Catholic school days of her and her classmates.

David Klaum's relationship with Catholic Charities of Long Island has always revolved around family.

His large family first became connected with Catholic Charities in 1983 when the youngest sibling, Mary Kay, moved into Bishop Ryan Residence in Copiague. Over the decades, her delightful sense of humor helped forge friendships with fellow residents and staff, and her heart embraced the arrival of each new niece and nephew. "She became the glue that held our family together," said David Klaum, who is in his third and final term as a member of our Board of Trustees.

The extended Klaum Family, including Mary Kay, was honored with Catholic Charities' Caritas Award at an unforgettable dinner ceremony in 2015.

Mary Kay was diagnosed with Down syndrome at birth. She suffered from serious eye problems, including one period when she became completely blind, before a doctor was able to restore sight in one eye. When her health declined further, the care and concern of the Catholic Charities staff exceeded her family's expectations. "They responded by taking her to doctors and specialists. That service alone was priceless to the family," said Klaum. He said his family regarded staff members working with Mary Kay, who entered eternal life in 2020, as "angels sent to support her."

They embodied the following words from Saint Katharine Drexel: "If we want to serve God and love our neighbor well, we must manifest our joy in the service we render to Him and them..."

Mary, whose young son Malichi is disabled, speaks highly of the assistance and the faith her family receives from Catholic Charities of Long Island's Project Independence, which provides housing and supportive services for clients formerly without a home. "It means everything," she says. "Words can't say the help I get from them. Pretty much everything. The goal is to always put my family in a better place, and to keep them safe and provide for them."

As Malichi recovered from an operation on his legs right before Christmas, he found joy in the green and red colored casts on both legs. Mary, who prays one day Malichi will rise and walk on his own, says the staff at Catholic Charities has given her hope, in Jesus' name, by providing practical support and spiritual encouragement.
