


The Catholic Church in America has established 168 networked Catholic Charities to continue the important work of our Lord Jesus Christ on behalf of the needy and vulnerable. Here on Long Island, with 1.2 million face-to-face visits in 2023 alone, Catholic Charities of Long Island (CCLI) ministers in the name of the Church of the Diocese of Rockville Centre.

Did you know, for instance, that these local Catholic Charities groups around the country combined last year to serve more than 15 million people or that they also provided over 30 million meals to the hungry? These dynamic responses directly answer the call of our Lord Jesus in Matthew 25:35-40 to remember the least among us. Caring for Long Islanders is our exclusive mission. By doing so we are "Eucharistic people" — offering our lives in service to one another for the glory of God.

Catholic Charities USA is currently leading a national awareness campaign called We Are There to promote the lifegiving work being done by Catholic Charities organizations. CCLI is an enthusiastic participant, along with dozens of other Catholic Charities organizations. The campaign, which began



in June, will continue until early 2025. Getting the word out features advertisements in national media outlets. Pope Francis himself mentioned this in his World Day of the Poor letter this year. Here at Catholic Charities on Long Island, we











are doing our part by sharing graphics like the ones on this page and other information about the campaign in our social media posts, blogs and website. In fact, we thought "We Are There" was such a good idea that we are making it the theme of this issue of The Mission.

OUR EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND CAN USE YOUR HELP

The Emergency Relief Fund has long been a dependable resource for many who seek help from Catholic Charities of Long Island. The fund assists those in dire need, whether the financial shortfall stems from temporary job loss, a costly car repair bill or rental arrears. The fund provides financial assistance in a crisis situation to allow a person, and their families, to get back on their feet. Those we serve are like the needy who "press in on Jesus" to seek his healing touch in the Gospels.

In recent years, CCLI did not have reliable funding for ERF. Bright spots have recently developed. The popular Pizza with a Purpose campaign, in which Long Island pizzerias agree to donate a portion of their Lenten sales to Catholic Charities, provided valuable seed money for the ministry. More recently, a substantial anonymous gift got the fund running at full force. "It means a lot more people can be helped," says Paula Malloy, director of Parish Social Ministry at CCLI.

Malloy spoke about a single mom, who sought help from ERF when an injury left her temporarily unable to work a second job requiring physical labor. After depleting her savings, the mom reached out to Catholic Charities and is now back at both jobs. "These are people who fall between the cracks and normally are not able to get help," explains Malloy, who anticipates that current ERP funding will soon be exhausted. COLLABORATING WITH CYO

Catholic Charities works with many Catholic organizations, and the mutual support benefits both. CCLI enjoys increasing collaboration with CYO Long Island, which engages more than 19,000 youth from Catholic parishes in Nassau and Suffolk counties in sports and other activities. "We're trying to get everyone involved," explained CYO executive director Carol Sciotto. "It's Catholic ministries helping Catholic ministries."

This year, CYO coaches and coordinators contributed funding for food and a DJ at the St. Valentine's Dance at Dominican Village in Amityville for residents of Catholic Charities group homes for the developmentally disabled. CYO staff members bought Mother's Day plants for Meals-on-Wheels recipients and planted flowers at Talbot House, a residential addiction stabilization center, and the Bustamante Residence for developmentally disabled adults. CYO also purchased Bluetooth speakers for our three senior community service centers as well as cases of diapers and wipes for young families. CYO athletes also crafted beautiful cards to share with seniors for Mother's Day, Easter, Valentine's Day and other holidays.
